- Decrease the percentage of students not achieving at or above grade level in literacy and numeracy

How will we get there

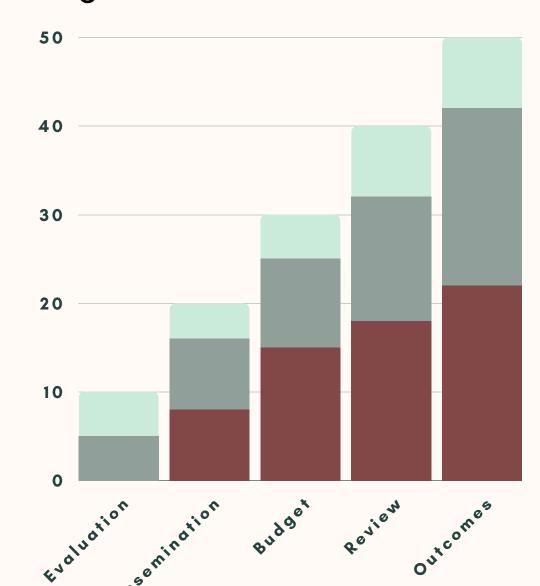
- Teacher collaborative PLC time embedded in the schedule for gr. 1-9, with established foci for literacy each month

- Pull-out intervention program is "paused" for thoughtful restructuring and supporting of classroom-based small group instruction

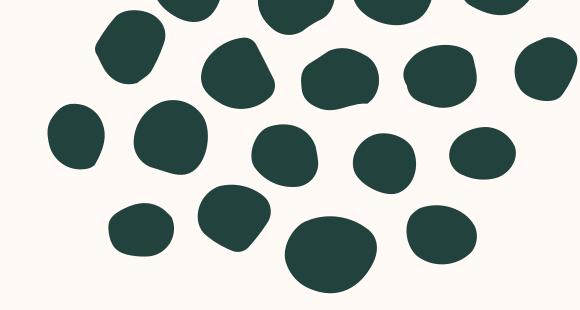
- Regular review of literacy data in school-wide database to inform planning, collaboration time, and student placement

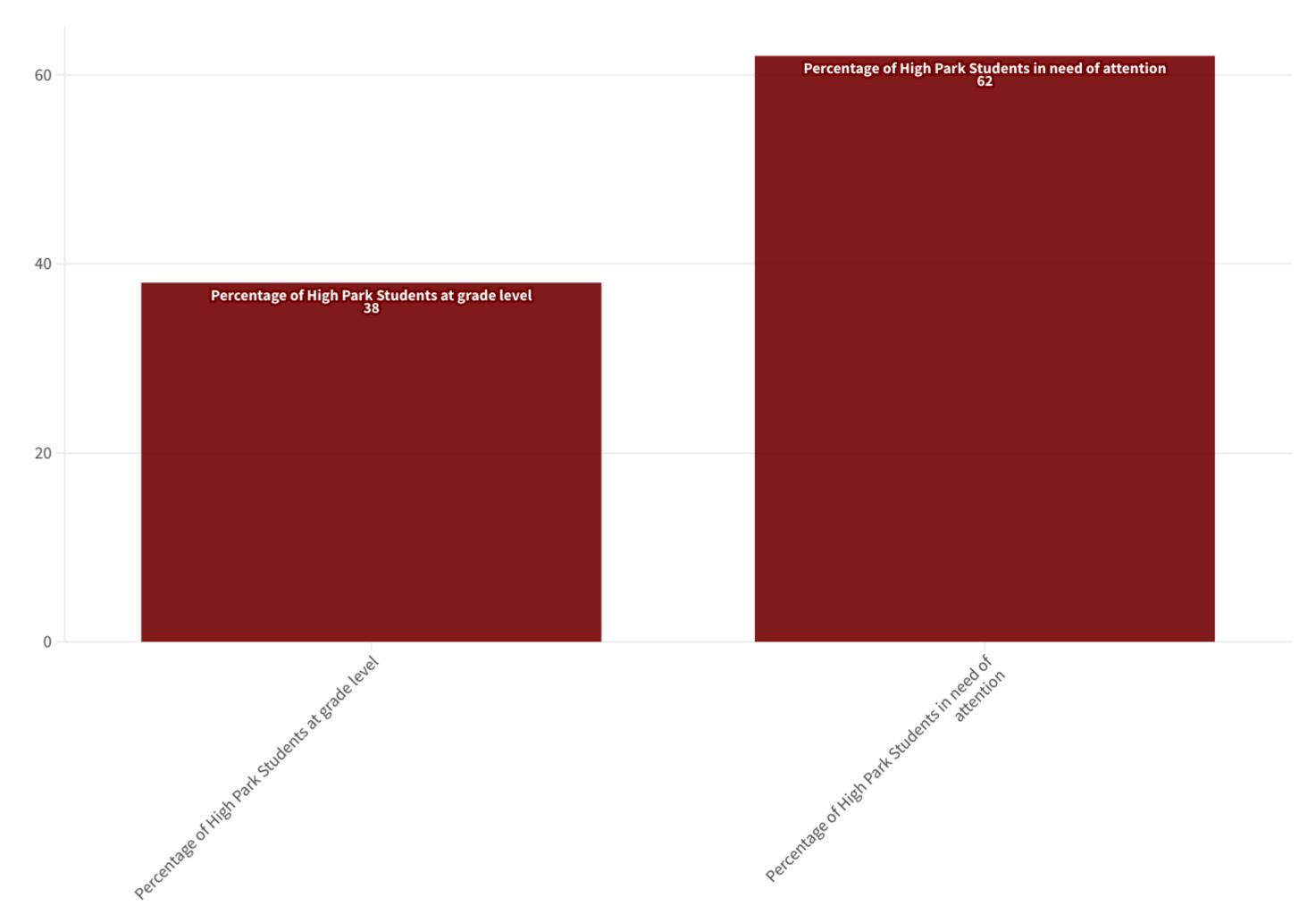
Our GOALS

Strategies for Growth

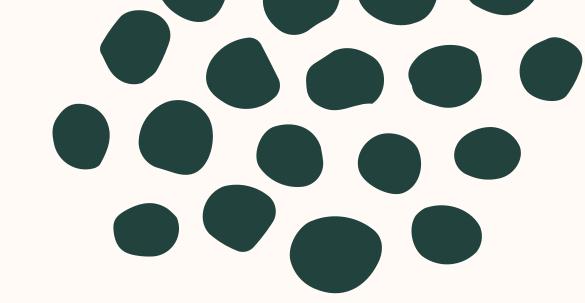
- Expand our resource hub for math manipulatives and teaching materials to support new curriculum and small group instruction

- Collaborative planning time with numeracy lead(s) scheduled at regular intervals

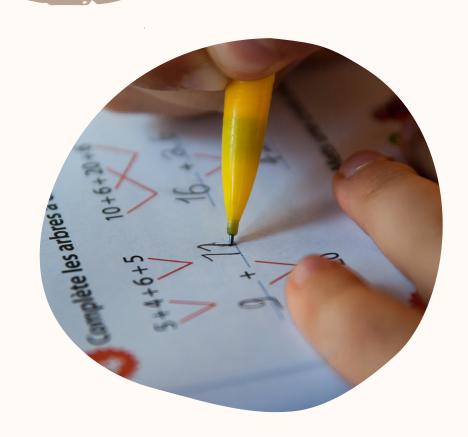
- Consistent, schoolwide approach to modeling positive math talk
